Touch our minds and hearts today as we read alone, as we proclaim in the liturgy, as we study together and, inspired anew, help us to become that Word for all who seek the way,



St Jerome and the Lion

In 2020, we mark the 1,600 anniversary of St Jerome's death. So who was St Jerome and why is he so important to the Bible? Why are there so many paintings of him with a lion?

St Jerome was above all a Scripture scholar, translating the Old and New Testaments from the Hebrew and Greek into Latin. He wrote many commentaries which are a great source of Scriptural inspiration for us today; and was a prodigious letterwriter with a bad temper. How do we make sense of something as big as the Bible? With 73 books it's no small read, without even trying to remember even a fraction of all the characters.

To help you with this challenge, each month we'll explore a different part of the Bible with our Scripture Seekers' series. We'll give a short summary of each book, its purpose and content, and help you see how it fits into the overall picture of God's plan for the world.

The whole point of reading and understanding the Bible is to encounter God, understand how he reveals himself to us and to grow in faith. But we do not read alone. We read the Bible within the tradition of the Church in order to benefit from the holiness and wisdom of all the faithful who have gone before us.

And don't forget, it's okay to start small – just a sentence, a verse, or a paragraph is enough to begin with.

After all, the shortest verse in the Bible is made up of just four words - 'Jesus began to weep' (John 11:35). Yet these words speak volumes about Jesus as a person – how he was not afraid to cry in public, the depth of his feelings for his dear friend Lazarus and how his reactions were human, just like ours.

Ezra read from the Law of God so that the people understood what was read.

JOURNEY WITH MATTHEW

Matthew the man


Very little is known about St Matthew, except that he was the son of Alpheus, and he was probably born in Galilee.

He was a tax collector (a hated profession during the time of Christ), when Christ came to him and asked him to follow him. Matthew got up and followed him and, with that, he became a disciple of Christ.

Matthew presents the teaching of Jesus with a sense of order, completeness and balance. His central focus is on making Jesus' words and action stand out clearly. His concern was that Jewish and Gentile Christians live together as a Church where all share in bringing the Gospel of the Kingdom to all people.

The Gospel account of Matthew is the first of the three synoptic Gospels; it tells a similar story to the other two synoptic Gospels – and that convinces scholars of its authenticity. It is believed that many years following the death of Christ, around 41 and 50 AD, Matthew wrote his Gospel. According to early tradition he wrote the book in Aramaic in the hope that his account would convince his readers that Jesus was the Messiah and that his Kingdom had been fulfilled in a spiritual way. This was significant at a time when almost everyone was expecting the return of a more militant and violent messiah brandishing a sword.





Matthew the Gospel writer

The Gospel of Matthew presents Jesus as a teacher from God, who is the expected Messiah and who personifies wisdom and embodies goodness.

The Kingdom of God is a central theme, which Matthew prefers to call the Kingdom of Heaven – and he refers to it as such more than 60 times. This distinction would have mattered hugely to the Jewish communities, because Jews do not pronounce the name of God.

Matthew's Gospel is written like a handbook, or catechism for the early Church, providing models for teaching, preaching, mission, community worship and dealing with disputes with outsiders. These are carefully woven into the story of Jesus and his mission. He presents a coherent perspective on Jesus, giving a rich account of Jesus' miracles and teachings while also placing them in their historical and religious context.

As Matthew is writing for a Jewish readership, his structuring of Jesus' teachings into five discourses is modelled on the five books of Moses, the Torah. The whole narrative of Jesus' life unfolds over 27 chapters. He presents Jesus as a New Moses giving a New Law. For example, he ascends the mountain in the Sermon on the Mount (Chapters 5-7) to deliver the New Law. His discourses go on to include mission (Chapter 10), the parables (Chapter 13), teachings on the Church (Chapter 18) and teachings on the future (Chapters 24-25). Matthew tells us early on, through the angel Gabriel, the Messiah to be born will be called "Immanuel, which means 'God with us'" (1:23). And, right at the end of his Gospel, Matthew completes his Gospel with Jesus' statement of his divinity.


Jesus tells his disciples, "I am with you always" (28:20).

Matthew talks about upheavals six times. Jerusalem is in turmoil when Jesus enters it, with the whole city asking, 'Who is this?' (21:10). At the upheaval of the cross, the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook and the rocks split (27:51) as Jesus breathed his last breath, tombs were opened and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised (27:52). When the centurions and those who were with them guarding Jesus saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!" (27:54). On Easter morning, Matthew speaks again of an earthquake (28:2) and how the angel of the Lord came and rolled back the stone of the tomb. The guards were so frightened, they shook and became like dead men (28:4).

There are other events which are only recorded in Matthew's Gospel, for example, Jesus' giving of "the keys" to Peter in 16:18 and the description of the Magi in Chapter 2. Matthew doesn't specify how many there are, but because he says that they brought gold, frankincense and myrrh, the popular belief is that there were three Magi or three kings as they are often called.

In the second century, St Irenaeus famously began to associate specific symbols from Ezekiel 1:1-21 and Revelation 4:6-8 with each of the four Gospels. He suggested that the winged man represented Matthew, saying:

"This, then, is the Gospel of his humanity; for which reason it is, too, that the character of a humble and meek man is kept up through the whole Gospel."

Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures...



Get Involved

There are so many ways you can get involved in this exciting Initiative. Whether as individuals, groups, parishes, deaneries or dioceses, the Bible is for everyone, of all ages and all interests.

Throughout 2020, our dioceses and communities are invited to explore:

- In what good ways do we celebrate, live and share God's word?
- Where might there be gaps? Is anyone excluded?
- What new ways and opportunities might be open to us?
- What actions can we take to encourage our communities to become more familiar with the Bible?

Matthew's Gospel



Grants to Support You

We are offering a small number of *Year of the Word* grants to help fund innovative projects that inspire individuals and communities to engage with Scripture across the dioceses.

You can apply for these grants from 1st October 2019 – 6th March 2020.

There are two funding streams, and we invite applications that fit either stream A or stream B below.

Stream A: Engaging Disabled Catholics

This stream of grant funding offers £1,000 for Scripture-based projects that equip and enable disabled Catholics to engage with the Bible.

Stream B: Creative Scriptural Projects

This stream offers funding to dioceses for Scripture-based projects that encourage an exploration of the Scriptures in a creative, innovative and sustainable way.

In particular, projects will be expected to:

- Reflect one of our 3 themes: Celebrating God's Word, Living God's Word or Sharing God's Word
- Respond to the particular need of a definable group or network of Catholics in your diocese
- Explore how this group or network is currently being supported in their Scriptural engagement
- Be rooted in Scripture, with engagement with the Bible at its heart, whilst being fresh and innovative
