

Policy for Prayer and Liturgy

Mission Statement

'Everyone at St.Francis' Catholic Primary School and Pre-School tries to be like Jesus. We work together to make our school and community a welcoming and happy place to learn. As children of God, we care for each other and we always try to do our best.'

The Nature of Prayer and Liturgy

We believe that Prayer and Liturgy in a Catholic school names and celebrates God's presence in our lives. It is concerned with giving glory, honour, praise and thanks to God. It is our loving response, in word and action, to God's invitation to enter into relationship, made possible through the work of Jesus Christ and the witness of the Holy Spirit.

Legal Requirements

We acknowledge the legal requirement that there must be a daily act of worship for all pupils. (This can take place at any time during the school day and can be either a single act of worship for all pupils, or separate acts of worship in school groups.) We understand that simply holding an assembly that includes a prayer, said either by the teacher or everyone present, does not fulfil this requirement. We also acknowledge that Prayer and Liturgy and assembly are distinct activities. They may sometimes form part of the same gathering, but the difference between the two will always be made clear.

The act of worship is not designated curriculum time under regulations and will not be subsumed under any part of the curriculum, including Religious Education.

We gather, using prayers or actions or music. Then, we listen to scripture, readings and / or poems. After that, we respond by doing something or saying a prayer together. Finally, we go forth by reflecting on the scripture and taking this forward into our work throughout the day. It is wonderful to see the children excited, enthusiastic and deepening their faith through prayer and liturgy. In each class, there is a prayer and liturgy book where pictures, planning templates and PowerPoints are kept as a reminder and record of the acts of worship. Each class has a 'big book' for prayer and liturgy. In year 5&6, pupils create their own reflection pages following prayer and liturgy sessions they have planned and delivered.

The Place of Prayer and Liturgy in the Life of our School

We endorse the belief that Prayer and Liturgy takes into account the religious and educational needs of all who share in it:

- > those who form part of the worshipping community in church
- > those for whom school may be their first and only experience of church
- those from other Christian traditions or none
- > those from other faith backgrounds.

It will be an educational activity or experience to which all can contribute and from which all can gain.

Worship in this school is more than just a legal requirement. It is an integral part of school life and central to the Catholic tradition.

To support the development of Prayer and Liturgy at home, we send home weekly Prayer Bags, which relate to Liturgical seasons and are differentiated for year groups. 'Wednesday word' activities are also sent home weekly to enable families to reflect on the weekly Gospel story.

The Aims of Prayer and Liturgy

We believe that Prayer and Liturgy in our school aims to provide opportunity for all pupils and staff:

to contemplate something of the mystery of God

- to reflect on spiritual and moral issues
- to explore their own beliefs
- to respond to and celebrate life
- to experience a sense of belonging and develop community spirit
- to develop a common ethos and shared values
- to enrich religious experience
- to grow in liturgical understanding and development
- to reinforce prayers which are part of the Catholic tradition
- to reinforce positive attitudes
- to participate fully
- to take time out to 'wonder at', 'to come to terms with' and 'to give worth to.'

Principles

All Prayer and Liturgy in this school will:

raise our minds and hearts to God

- celebrate the presence of God in our life and school community
- > be a high quality activity, fundamental to the life of the school and its Catholic
- character

support learners' spiritual development

- > give learners positive liturgical experiences, appropriate to their age, aptitude
- and family backgrounds. In order to do this, celebrations will:

- be simple, including a range of experiences offered in a variety of groupings and in a variety of settings, including outdoors;
- seek to involve learners at all times in preparation and leadership.

Organisation

Children pray in different groups during the week.

Prayer and Liturgy always follows the liturgical seasons.

Other times of prayer and worship in the school year include (as outlined on whole school curriculum maps) :

- Mass to celebrate the beginning of the school year
 - A weekly Mass which one class attends on a rolling timetable
 - Celebration of Feast Days Mass in the church for Holy Days of obligation. Appropriate liturgies for other Feast Days.
 - Reconciliation Services for Key Stage 2 in Advent and Lent
 - KS2 Advent Liturgy
 - Christmas and Easter Prayer Services for the whole school
 - The Way of the Cross reflection during Lent for the whole school.
 - KS1 Palm Liturgy
 - Easter reflections presented by each class
 - May Procession for the whole school, parents and Parish
 - Trips to Ladyewell
 - Mass to pray especially for the Year 6 leavers

The Planning, Content and Delivery of Prayer and Liturgy

Prayer and Liturgy is planned:

following a structure with reference to the church's seasons using the diocese prayer and liturgy support leaflets, scripture, our R.E. scheme ('The Way, the Truth, the Life'), significant dates and the curriculum. Scripture is the focus in most acts of worship and we place utmost importance on our response to God's message. We explore themes throughout the year, for example Pope Francis' Encyclical, and how we can make links from these themes to scripture.

Classroom toolkits and planning frames

Pupils are encouraged to participate in the planning and delivery of Prayer and Liturgy in class and Key Stage acts of worship. In Key Stage 1, pupils may assist the class teacher in selecting appropriate resources (e.g. music, artwork, prayers) to fit with a given theme. The teacher selects the scripture 'Word' for the Celebration of the Word. As children progress through Key Stage 2, they take more responsibility for planning and leading class worship (such as selecting the scripture for celebrating the word).. Children lead Lectio Divina and Visio Devina and they independently plan class prayer and liturgy sessions, supported by the teacher, knowing where to find the resources they need. Starting points are a theme linked to the current strand of the curriculum/or linked to the liturgical year.

We also use tenten assembly and classroom prayer resources to reflect on the previous Sunday's Gospel. Pupils lead theses session as 'prayer leaders' from KS1.

Guided meditation is used in upper Key Stage 2. Children are given the opportunity to reflect on a given piece of scripture and take part in a guided meditation led by the class teacher. The TenTen HRSE resource 'Life To The Full' is used to enable pupils to reflect on bible stories in terms of how they are relevant to their own lives and the lives of others.

Recording

Prayer and Liturgy is recorded:

- on a liturgy planner to keep note of themes, leaders, learner groupings and resources
- through displays, on the school website, class floor books, collections of learners' contributions, prayers, reflections, photographs, videos etc.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Throughout the school year, the school's provision of worship will be evaluated to consider whether it meets the needs of all learners and whether learners are making progress in acquiring skills and abilities in organising and leading worship. This is monitored by the RE subject leader and SLT.

Eucharist

Children who have completed their First Holy Communion are welcomed to receive the Eucharist at Mass. Those children who have not made their First Holy Communion receive a blessing from the priest.

At **Key Stage 1** worship includes:

short, simple liturgies with ritual and variety

- > occasional liturgies reflecting the Introductory Rites in the Mass and/or the
- Liturgy of the Word
- At Key Stage 2 worship includes:
 - short, simple liturgies with ritual and variety
 - occasional liturgies reflecting the Introductory Rites in the Mass or the Liturgy of
 - the Word; or the Eucharistic Prayer; and/or the Communion Rite.
